Medieval metalwork is one of the artistic highlights of the Iranian world. The Département des Arts de l'Islam at the Louvre holds more than 150 objects from this period and although this is one of the most important collections in the world, to date many objects have never been studied or published before.

An ambitious project for the archaeometallurgical research of these objects known as ISLAMETAL was established to provide vital new information on the processes, places, and craftsmen linked to their production. The results of this far-reaching investigation, which included material analysis as well as close examination of each object, is at the heart of this volume and allowed the author Annabelle Collinet to propose new categorisations for many of the objects.


This book offers a fresh look at the works, providing a comprehensive overview of medieval production, a full technical analysis, and a presentation of the collection through the lens of its centres of manufacture, as well as the functions and contexts in which the pieces were used. Each object is fully described and illustrated in colour with many close up or X-ray images.

A comprehensive overview of Hajj, one of the central pillars of Islam.

Hajj and the Arts of Pilgrimage contains twenty-seven essays addressing objects in the remarkable collection of Nasser David Khalili which features more than five thousand objects relating to the arts of pilgrimage dating from the eighth century to today, and includes Qur'ans, illustrated manuscripts, rare books, scientific instruments, textiles, coins, paintings, prints and photo-postcards, as well as archival material, unique historical documents and examples of the work of some of the earliest Muslim photographers of Hajj. Together, the essays collected in Hajj and the Arts of Pilgrimage provide a comprehensive overview of Hajj, illustrating the religious, spiritual, cultural and artistic aspects of pilgrimage to the Holy Sanctuaries of Islam and the cosmopolitan nature of Hajj itself. Each essay is written by a prominent specialist in the field and beautifully illustrated with full-colour images of objects from the collection, some of which have never been seen in print before. Taking readers from the early history of Islam to the fascinating story of the Western view of Muslim pilgrimage, these essays will transform our perception of Hajj.

Nahla Nassar graduated with a BA Honours in Fine Art and Archaeology from the American University of Beirut. She has been Curator and Registrar of the Khalili Collection of Islamic Art since 1989.

Qaisra M. Khan is Curator of the Khalili Collections of Hajj and the Arts of Pilgrimage.

Julian Raby is director emeritus of the Freer|Sackler, the Smithsonian's Museums of Asian Art in Washington. Throughout his career he has written numerous books and articles in the field of Islamic art, and founded the *Oxford Studies in Islamic Art*.


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The articles in this volume were first presented at the Historians of Islamic Art Association's (HIAA) seventh biennial symposium entitled 'Regime Change'. The nine articles in this volume highlight some of the regimes of thought and changing trends that structure the field of Islamic art history. The authors present new research exploring the intentions of patrons, the agency of craftsmen and their responses to previous artistic production, thereby allowing artefacts and monuments to be set within their historical, social and artistic contexts. This fully illustrated volume looks at a wide range of topics from discussing the changes to Qur'an production due to dynastic and political regime changes in Sumatra and the Malay peninsula to changes in the role and status of designers and weavers making silk in Khurasan in the post-Mongol period; it explores Safavid art and architecture and how the rise of photography and new printing techniques shaped the production, exchange and transmission of images in Iran and Turkey.

Christiane Gruber is Professor of Islamic Art in the History of Art Department at the University of Michigan as well as Founding Director of *Khamseen: Islamic Art History Online*. Her recent publications include The *Praiseworthy One: The Prophet Muhammad in Islamic Texts and Images* and *The Image Debate: Figural Representation in Islam and Across the World*.


This volume explores the myriad ways in which Iran's unique position in the world and its painful encounters with colonial powers affected and defined its treatment of decolonisation. The occupation of Iran during the Second World War subordinated it to the imperial powers, an experience that changed Iran's relationship with the West and the emerging bipolar world. Most scholarly work on Iran's global interactions in the postwar period until the revolution is centred around the Cold War and Iran's relations with the Soviet Union and the West. Little attention has been paid to how Iran interacted with other regions, such as Africa, Asia and Latin America, or to its engagement with global concerns over racism, gender discrimination, and economic inequality.

Adding to an important and growing body of literature that discusses the profound and lasting impact of colonialism, Iran and Global Decolonisation contributes to the historical and theoretical debates around the reshaping of the world brought about by the end of empire. It considers the influence of global decolonisation on ideas within Iran and assesses how Iran's unique experiences of imperialism shaped these ideas. In this way, this volume contributes to the historiography of the Iranian Revolution and its anti-imperialist impulses.

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Nationalism in the Architecture of Modern Iran

This research provides a historical account of the development of the idea of nationalism in the architectural discipline in Iran between 1905-2015. It aims to provide the details of what it means to design a building that bears an 'Iranian' or 'Islamic-Iranian' identity and to construct a conceptual platform for critically assessing such representations of national identity in contemporary architecture. This book will give art historians and a broader audience a comprehensive understanding of the modern history of architecture in Iran. This is a much needed contribution as Iran is one of the least discussed countries in this regard but offers many similarities to other Middle Eastern contexts and discloses the active role of internationally renowned Western architects.

Niloofar Kakhi is an architect and researcher. She received her PhD in Histories and Theories of Architecture from Architectural Association. She has recently finished a Visiting Research Fellowship at the University of St Andrews.

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
